



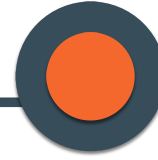

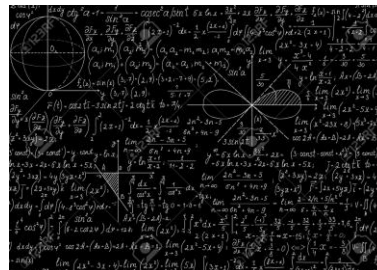
Implicit and Explicit Information

Implicit

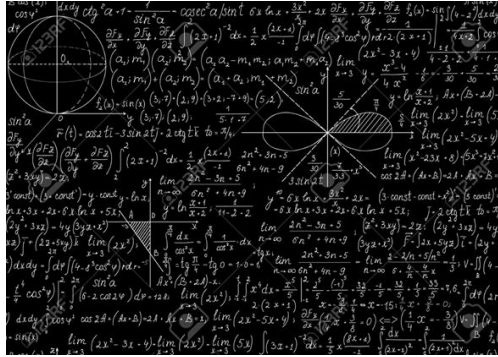
- Understood but not necessarily stated
- May be culturally bound
- Based on shared history or shared world view
- Relies on Prior Knowledge

Explicit

- Overtly stated

Illocutionary Force

Illocutionary Force

The speaker's intention in producing that utterance

- Interrogative
- Imperative
- Optative
- Declarative

“Open the door”

“Could you open the door?”

“I was *just* saying that”

“I was just *saying* that”

“How are you?”
